The Pastor's Reflections

The players were beginning to mobilize to begin a horrifying journey into darkness. The Fascist Revolutionary Party was founded in Italy in 1915. In 1919, Adolf Hitler joined the rapidly growing Nazi Party in Germany. In 1922, Benito Mussolini became Italy's Prime Minister, and Josef Stalin

became the leader of the Communist Party in Russia. In 1923, Hitler established his Hitler Youth Movement. In 1926 crown prince Hirohito would ascend the throne of Japan.

The year was 1925. Pope Pius XI declared a Holy Year on the occasion of the 1600th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea. It was this Council that added a phrase to the Creed: "*and of his kingdom there will be no end.*" On December 11th 1925, in conjunction with the Holy Year, the pope issued a Motu Proprio, *Quas Primas* (translated: As Soon as Possible). In it he wrote: "When we pay honor to the primary dignity of Christ, men will doubtless be reminded that the Church, founded by Christ as a perfect society, has a natural and inalienable right to perfect freedom and immunity from the power of the state."

The Holy Father, reading the signs of the times,



saw the dark forces gathering. He pointed to the dangers inherent in the rise of secularism and nationalism. Much of the *Motu Proprio* dealt with the relationship between the Church and the State. In it, he clearly stated that the Church had the right to worship freely, and to govern its internal matters without the interference of the State.

It was in that same *Motu Proprio* that Pius XI confronted the political movements that were threatening society by establishing the Feast of Christ the King. It was to be celebrated throughout the universal Church. Presenting Christ as King, he held him up in contrast to the totalitarian leaders and their regimes that were gaining in power and popularity.

He wrote: "He is truth itself, and it is from him that truth must be received by all mankind. He reigns, too, in the wills of men, for in him the human will was perfectly and entirely obedient to the Holy Will of God, and further, by his grace and inspiration, he so subjects our free-will as to incite us to the most noble endeavors. He is King of hearts, too, by reason of his love which excels all knowledge."

To understand Christ as king we must stand be-

fore the cross. As we look up we see Jesus, the anointed Christ and redeemer, “*the King of the Jews*,” reigning over the secular world. It’s from this judgment seat that truth judges untruth. Love judges hate. Powerlessness judges power.

Pius XI, could look at Christ on the cross and see the 1.5 million Armenians who had been executed or starved to death only ten years earlier. His successor, Pius XII, would also look at the crucified Christ. He would see 6 million European Jews, 7 million from Ukraine and the Soviet block countries. Over the course of the next 22 years the crucified Christ would extend his arms to embrace 60 million victims who would perish at the hands of dictators, and a global war machine. Embracing them from the cross he passes judgment on the world for its atrocities.

The Feast of Christ the King coincides with the last Sunday of the Liturgical Year. The following Sunday, the First Sunday of Advent, celebrates the beginning of the New Year. In the Judeo-Christian liturgical tradition, the New Year celebration is a pivot point. It begins by holding up the world for divine judgment. It ends by extending the lamp of hope for a world reborn.


I’ve shared the origin of the Feast of Christ the King because I fear that we’ve begun to ignore its message. When you look at Christ enthroned on the cross, what do you see. What do you say to yourself? If you say, “Poor Jesus! Look what they’ve done to him,” you’re not grasping the true and deepest meaning of the cross. Five days before he was arrested, Jesus clearly defined its meaning. “*Now is the time of judgment on this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And when I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw everyone to myself. (John 12: 31-32)*”

On the cross Jesus died in a gas chamber. On the cross Jesus was starved to death. On the cross Jesus died in a refugee camp. On the cross Jesus died attempting to bring his family into a land of hope and prosperity. On the cross Jesus died because of his sexual orientation. On the cross Jesus died because he was a woman of no value. On the cross Jesus died because “he was one of them.”

Lifted up on the cross Jesus is the eternal symbol of love. Don’t ever forget what he taught his disciples at his last supper with them. “*This is my commandment: love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one’s life for one’s friends. (John 15: 12-13)*” We MUST be aware of the suffering in the world. We MUST be aware of the prejudice and injustice plaguing the human family. We MUST be aware. We MUST be aware! We MUST hear the scripture of the First Sunday of Advent: “*Be watchful! Be*

alert! (Mark: 13:33) We must NEVER rest. We must NEVER be complacent.

Christ the King, enthroned on the cross, passes judgment on the rulers of this world, and on all of us. From the cross he also offers the hope of a world redeemed. Jesus called it “*the kingdom of God*.” We must never lose sight of that kingdom, that new world. With our eyes lifted up to the cross, we continue to labor to bring light into the darkness, to transform selfishness into self-giving, to transform every society through the power of our love, to bring about the Kingdom of God on earth.



The special lift has been removed from the church. The John Tiedermann Company has finished plastering and repainting a number of spots that had peeled or were flaking due to past leaks.

You may have noticed that the scaffolding on the exterior of the dome is down. We finished the repair of the windows and extensive masonry work. The scaffolding and repairs cost \$350,000.

The work that has been done so far had been paid in full! We were able to make these repairs because of your generosity to the RENEW AND REBUILD campaign.

ST. JEAN BAPTISTE MISSION SOCIETY



This is the Eymadian scholasticate at Pune, a city three hours' drive from Mumbai. There are 18 students here. There are 5 Philosophy students and 13, theology students. All together there are 18 students with 2 priests. They are studying in the seminary run by the Jesuits called Janna Deepa Vidyapeeth. It is a pontifical institute with close to 900 seminarians belonging to most of the dioceses in India and many religious congregations.

Total number of our students presently in formation is 18.

Educational fees for philosophy and theology for a year per student for two semesters is US \$ 307 (RS 20000). US \$154 per semester.

The cost of caring for a student's food, clothing, travel expenses, and personal needs for a month is US \$75 (Rs: 4875).



This is the Lamure Novitiate house at Goa. There are 6 novices at the moment. It is a two year program consisting of spiritual and religious formation. Here they are basically trained on the life and the

mission of the Congregation. They are here for the full two years, and all their expenses are fully met by the Congregation. Since it is formation program specifically for those interested in joining the Congregation, the Congregation assumes the expenses for education, boarding and lodging met the congregation. An expected 12 would join in May of 2018, and 5 from this group will join the seminary for further studies in September.

The Average cost of education would be US \$154 (Rs 10000) per year.

The cost of caring for a student's food, clothing, travel expenses, and personal needs for a month is US \$60 (Rs:4000).

On the occasion of Mission Sunday I proposed the establishment of a **MISSION SOCIETY** here at St. Jean's. I extend an invitation to all our parishioners to partner with the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament in India. We have vibrant communities there and many vocations. Our greatest challenge there is the support of our seminarians. Believe it or not, we sometimes have to turn young men away because we cannot cover the costs for their theological education.

The purpose of the **MISSION SOCIETY** would be, first of all, to learn about the work of the Order and its particular mission to India. Secondly, the Society would have the task to stimulate giving throughout the year for the specific purpose of supporting the seminarians' education. Society and the parish at large.

A number of parishioners have already joined this missionary effort. If you are moved to become one of the founding members of the **MISSION SOCIETY** please leave your name and telephone number at the rectory.

Father Jegaraj, Provincial Superior of the Indian Province, has sent us pictures of the Novices and Seminarians and an explanation of the expenses incurred for their formation.

This can be an important mission for our parish community. It will also be a blessing for the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament in India. Thank you for your interest and support.
