The Pastor's Reflections

Before focusing our reflection on the Gospel passage, I would like to recall the first scripture for today, the account of Elisha and the Shunammite woman.

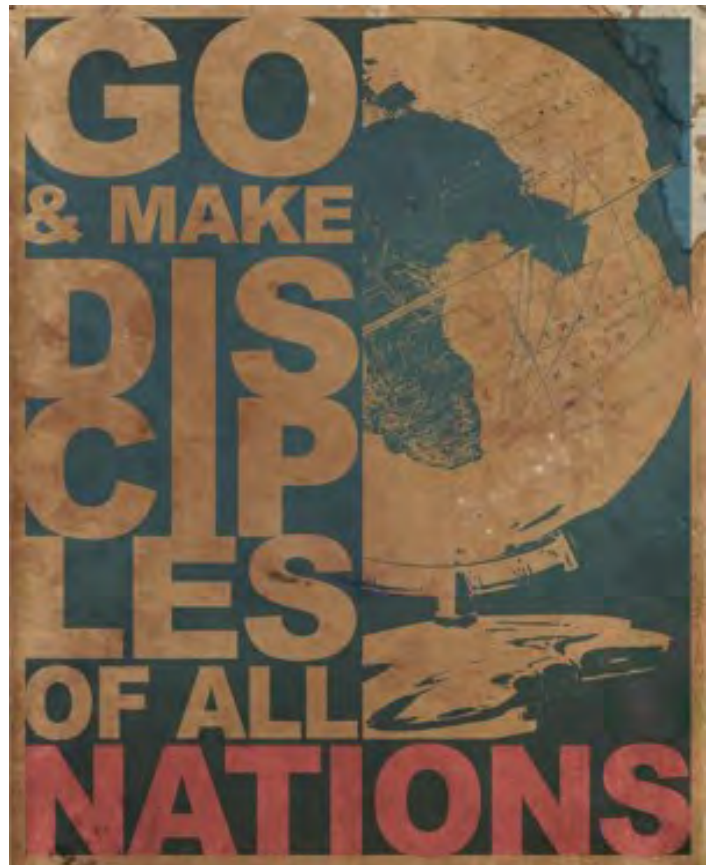
The First and Second Book of Kings covers a period in Jewish history before the horrific Babylonian invasion of 538 BC, and the mass deportations that followed. The Books weave the lives of the great prophet Elijah and his successor Elisha into the political history that spanned their lifetimes.

This story about Elisha teaches a beautiful moral which Jesus will carry into his teaching in today's Gospel passage. The story is a simple one. A "woman of influence" invited Elisha to dine in her home. As time went on he stayed with her and her husband many times. Eventually the woman was given permission to construct a guest room for Elisha and his servant Gehazi on her rooftop so that the prophet would have a comfortable place to stay whenever he came to the area.

Elisha was touched by her generosity, and her desire to care for his welfare. He was, what might be called, "the court prophet." He was God's representative to the king and his generals. He would offer them advice and deliver God's messages to them. So in appreciation, Elisha asked the woman if he could say a good word to the king on her behalf – a political reward. She replied that she had no need for such a reward. So Elisha asked Gehazi what he thought could be done to reward her. Gehazi answered his question; "She has no son and her husband is getting on in years." Gehazi was then asked to bring the woman to Elisha. She reverently stood

outside the door of his room. He then made a spectacular announcement to her, "This time next year you will be fondling a baby son."

This story mirrors the story of Abraham in the Book of Genesis. He gave hospitality to three men who were walking by his tent during the heat of the day. He invited them in, washed their feet, gave them something to drink, and

cooked a banquet for them. After the dinner they announced to him that he would have a son even though he was old, and Sarah was well beyond childbearing age. The moral of both stories is quite clear. Selfless hospitality will reap an unimaginable reward from God.

In the second part of today's Gospel passage Jesus builds upon this moral. *"Whoever receives a prophet because he is a prophet will receive a prophet's reward, and whoever receives a righteous man because he is a righteous man will receive a righteous man's reward."* (Matthew 10:41) Jesus doesn't specify the reward but implies that it will be like Abraham's, Sarah's and the Shunammite woman's. God will touch that part of their lives that is unfulfilled. Selflessness will always reap a profound reward from God.

But Jesus is not merely moralizing about hospitality, he's extending the principle in order to define the spiritual prerequisites for discipleship. The first part of the passage enumerates them. *"Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me, and whoever loves daughter or son more than me is not worthy of me."* (Matthew 10:37) The selflessness of the disciple must be rooted in an expansive love that transcends even the powerful bonds of family. It must be a selflessness like that of Jesus himself. *"Whoever does not take up his cross and follow after me is not worthy of me."* (Matthew 10:38)

Jesus is demanding a radical response from us, his disciples. We must be brave enough to lose ourselves, to abandon our ego, to empty ourselves, to love ourselves out of existence. *"Whoever finds his life will lose it, and whoever loses his life for my sake will find it."* (Matthew 10:39)

In last week's Gospel passage from the same chapter 10, Jesus told the disciples three times, *"Do not be afraid!"* We're all afraid, aren't we? Look what he's asking of us. In John's Gospel Jesus put it this way. *"Amen, amen, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit."* (John 12:24) The only way we can become who we truly are, who God created us to be, is to abandon our false self – to let it die so that the true self can emerge. This is a universal mystical principle. Many people think that it's only part of Hindu and Buddhist spiritual teaching, but Jesus understood very well this teaching of the sages. However, for him, this was only a platform from

which to leap to a reality none of the sages could ever have imagined!

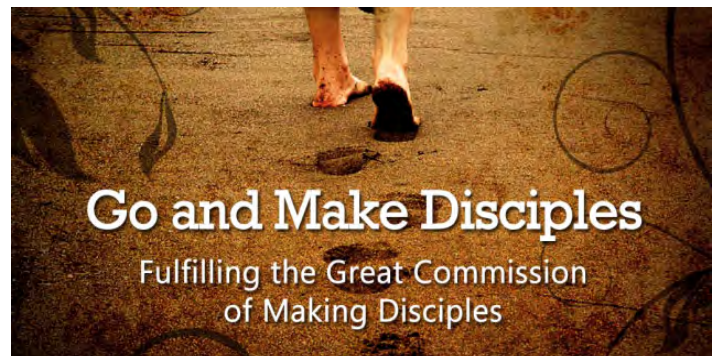
"Whoever receives you receives me, and whoever receives me receives him who sent me." (Matthew 10:40) Here Jesus is telling his disciples, his messengers, who have been called, and have accepted to carry his teaching, that their work is so much more than repetition of his teachings. Because they have died to themselves he is living in them. They have become his real presence. *"Whoever receives you receives me."* In us, he continues to draw the world to himself. In him and through him, the world is consecrated and selflessly offered to the Father.

When we speak of the Eucharist, we refer to the "real presence of Christ," the abiding presence of the resurrected Lord under the appearance of bread and wine. Jesus is telling us that we are his "real presence," so that through us the work of redemption continues.

Don't be afraid to die – to give the gift of your self to the Father as Jesus did. Always keep clearly in your mind Jesus' words at the supper before he accepted the cross. *"It was not you who chose me, but I who chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit that will remain."* (John 15:16)

Reflect often on the last three verses of Matthew's Gospel. We have been chosen to offer his life to everyone and anyone who might accept it. Don't be afraid to show them the way – don't be afraid to die to self. Don't be afraid to bear much fruit.

"All power in heaven and earth has been given to me. Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20)

RELIGIOUS LIFE IN THE CATHOLIC CHURCH 2017

I am currently the Pastoral Associate at the Cathedral of St. Joseph in Hartford, CT. This is a position that I knew in grace would be the culmination of my teaching in schools in New York City and Chicago and then in parishes in Kentucky and Florida. There I often helped build a Catholic identity in mostly rural counties where Catholics were a minority.

The Cathedral of St. Joseph is made up of a very diverse population in Hartford, Ct. One of my greatest joys is the “picture” of the Communion line of ministers; men and women, young and old, lectors, Eucharistic Ministers, and altar servers representing a wide array of countries of the world. Togo, Nigeria, South Africa, refugees from Thailand originally from Burma, Jamaica, Argentina, Poland, Ireland, Italy and the Phillipines to name some. Pastorally we have made a concerted effort to invite this great diversity of people into the ministry of God’s family since they have chosen the Cathedral as their parish.

In the spirit of Marguerite Bourgeoys and in Visitation style, I work the weekend Masses, meeting and welcoming new families, learning about their origins and making connections for Baptismal preparation.

The weekend liturgies are my “fertile ground” right where most of the people are. In the past few years, I have gathered together the high school girls and the older Karen girls, refugees from Thailand, at my apartment. It has proven to be their time to be girls, sharing and learning from one another. My sister Margaret has worked with the girls, sharing her love of cooking and crafts with them to prepare Mexican and American cuisine and creating “works of art”. The girls have also shared their Asian food and fruits with us.

I hear Marguerite Bourgeoys’ voice, “If you educate a woman, you educate a family.” The Karen girls are very busy with family obligations, especially if both parents are working to pay the rent, to buy a vehicle, food and provide education. The times that they get away to my place outside of Hartford truly contribute to building their inner lives. It has been a continuing joyful time of companionship.

I have found in my ministry at the Cathedral, that each altar server, lector and Eucharistic Minister in turn invites, trains, and incorporates new ministers into the fold. I see myself as a conduit of God’s grace.

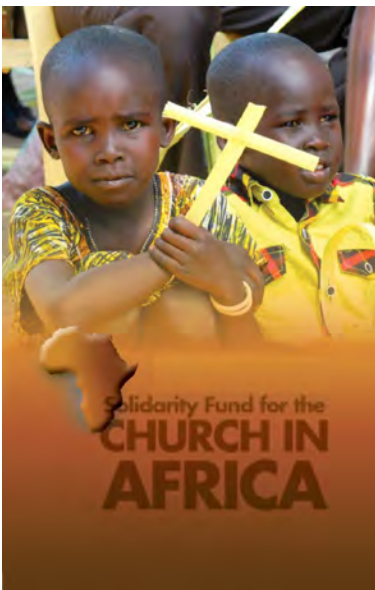
It was a delightful evening filled with lively music, good food and good cheer. The St. Jean's team keeps this community alive and well, and we can't thank them enough.

WORLD APOSTOLATE OF FATIMA, OUR LADY'S BLUE ARMY SHRINE

RENEW AND REBUILD CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

We're underway! We've signed contracts with PASCOM SOUND to conclude the upgrading of the sound system in the church. This involves a great deal of digital programming, and the installation of two major speakers (one is 15 feet long and the other 7 feet), and replacing and repositioning the present speakers in the church. This has a price tag of \$59,985. We're budgeting an additional \$10,000 for electrical work. The school auditorium is getting a completely new system. We've budgeted \$75,000 for the sound system and electrical work.

Both the church and the auditorium are daunting projects because of the amount of reverberation in both spaces. The church has the additional challenge of the many columns that interfere with the streaming of direct sound. To address that issue, we're going to add new speakers on the columns. We



don't have a date for the installation work yet. We've given a down payment of \$40,000 to purchase the speakers from the manufacturer.

A sidewalk bridge has been erected along 76th street. Over the next few weeks we'll be scaffolding the dome in preparation for some stone repair at the base of the copper roof, and the recaulking, painting and sealing of the 12 stained glass windows. The construction of the scaffold will take about a month, the window and stonework about 6 weeks, and another month to take down the scaffold. (That's if everything goes as planned. Enough said!) The down payment for the scaffolding was \$100,000 with another \$26,000 to be paid at the conclusion of the job. The window repair and restoration was estimated at \$60,000. The stone work can't be estimated until the stone is inspected after the scaffold has been erected.

Finally, FELIX CHAVEZ, INC. is currently working in the vestibule of the church repainting parts of the walls that have been damaged over the years. The company is also restoring the exterior doors that aren't in good shape. They suffer from extensive exposure to rain and snow. This is a \$25,000 project.

We thank everyone who donated to the 2016-17 RENEW AND REBUILD CAMPAIGN that the diocese initiated. We're presently waiting for the first check from the diocese, about \$100,000. Concerned and generous parishioners give regularly for the maintenance of the church building. We managed to squirrel away \$179,000 outside the RENEW AND REBUILD CAMPAIGN for restoration maintenance. We're using this money to jumpstart the present projects. Thank you for your stewardship and dedication to the maintenance of this architectural gem and monument to the Catholic faith.
