The Pastor's Reflections



The story Jesus is telling may, at first glance, seem to be a contrived story about a group of ten young women who were part of a wedding celebration. However, the people who heard Jesus deliver this story would have immediately related to the situation. In the Middle East, and Jesus' Palestine in particular, a wedding was not only the greatest event in a couple's life, it also involved the whole village. A wedding was so important that rabbis agreed that a man could, without any condemnation, leave his study of the sacred scriptures in order to join in a wedding celebration.

Part of the excitement of the wedding was anticipating the arrival of the bridegroom. It could be in a few hours, or at midnight, or tomorrow. No one knew the exact time of his arrival. Often enough, however, the bridegroom would arrive late at night. Often, the bridal party, which would be napping off, would be awoken by a distant cry, "The bridegroom is coming!" A drummer, leading the procession, would take the longest route so that as many people as possible would have an opportunity to join the procession. The wedding party awaiting his arrival would take

their lighted lamps to greet the procession and accompany the revelers into the home. The doors would then be locked, and the wedding reception would begin.

As an introduction to the parable of the ten young women, it will be helpful to situate it in the greater landscape of Matthew's Gospel. Chapter 21 began with Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday. Chapters 22 and 23 recorded the vicious attacks the religious leaders launched at Jesus. In reply to their attacks he hurled parable after parable at them, each one condemning them for their lack of faith in him. In chapter 24 he announced that a great transition was about to begin. He said

that the Coming of the Son of Man was very near, and he made reference to the prophecy of Daniel.

"At that time there shall arise Michael, the great prince, guardian of the people. It shall be a time unsurpassed in distress since nations began until that time. At that time your people shall escape, everyone who is found written in the book. Many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake. Some shall live forever, others shall be an everlasting horror and disgrace. But the wise shall shine brightly like the splendor of the firmament. And those who lead the many to justice shall be like the stars forever. (Daniel 12:1-3)"

Jesus was telling the religious leaders, and everyone who would listen to him, that the great day of purification was near, the Day of the Coming of the Son of Man. This was the day, in Jewish tradition, when God would purify the earth of all and every evil. It would be a terrible day of divine judgment. It was at this point in the Gospel narrative, chapter 25, that Jesus told the parable of the ten young women awaiting the arrival of the bridegroom. He began with a short introduction. *"The kingdom of heaven will be like ten virgins (young unmarried women) who took*

their lamps and went out to meet the bridegroom.”

The ten young women in the tale were friends of the bride. They were keeping her company as they awaited the arrival of the bridegroom. Five of the women were smart. Not knowing when the bridegroom would come, they brought extra oil for their lamps. The other five were foolish. They didn't think ahead, and so waited with only the oil they had in their lamps. *“At midnight the cry came, ‘Behold, the bridegroom! Come out to meet him.’”* The foolish attendants' oil lamps were just about out of oil. They wanted to borrow some oil from their wise counterparts but were told, instead, to go buy their own. But it was too late. By the time they returned everyone had entered the wedding reception. As was the custom, no late-comers would be allowed in. *“The other virgins came and said, ‘Lord, Lord, open the door for us!’ But he said in reply, ‘Amen, I say to you, I do not know you.’”*

The day of Jesus' was very near. In the next chapter, chapter 26, he would celebrate the Passover at his last supper with his disciples. From his throne, the cross, Jesus, the Son of Man, would pass judgment on the world. At the same time, he would redeem it.

This parable is reminding everyone that they must be ready for this day of reckoning and redemption. Everyone must be prepared for the new time. Though Jesus would redeem the world through his self-sacrifice on the cross, each of us must prepare ourselves to enter the Wedding Feast of the Lamb. Entry into the feast is not automatic. Our lives must be like lamps burning brightly to welcome the bridegroom, the risen Lord. Only then will we be welcomed to the wedding feast.

Let's get practical. What does this parable mean for you and me? Jesus concludes his parable by cautioning all of us. *“Therefore, stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour.”* This is a frequent request that Jesus makes. This parable warns us of the end time, the time of the Last Judgment. We will never know when that moment might come, so we need to have our lives in order. We have to live every day as if it were our last.

We're also cautioned that we can't presume to lean on the graces of others in order to enter the kingdom of heaven. We're responsible for our own preparedness. It's up to us to keep our lamps burning brightly.

In the context of Matthew's Gospel, the lamps that welcome the bridegroom are the Beatitudes. They're our inner light. We're to be poor of spirit, relying on God to be our only strength. We're to hunger for a world where justice reigns, and we labor to bring it about. We're to be honest and truthful people, the pure of heart. We're to be merciful and loving, just as God is merciful and loving. We're to be peacemakers in our families and society.

The Beatitudes draw us into every aspect of life. They're the oil that sustains our light. They're the divine energy that enables us to be the light of the world. They're the ticket to the Wedding Feast of the Lamb.

MISSION SOCIETY

On the occasion of Mission Sunday I proposed the establishment of a **MISSION SOCIETY** here at St. Jean's. Each year we take up several collections to help support the evangelization efforts of the Church throughout the world. We have a collection for the Propagation of the Faith, for World Mission Sunday and for the Missions of the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament.

This is all well and good. However, our giving tends to be distant and unattached. I would like to partner with the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament in India. We have vibrant communities there and many vocations. Our greatest challenge there is the support of our seminarians. Believe it or not, we sometimes have to turn young men away because we cannot cover the costs for their theological education.

Presently, our Indian Province has ninety in formation. This is wonderful and cause for rejoicing, but also a tremendous financial challenge. The purpose of the **MISSION SOCIETY** would be, first of all, to learn about the work of the Order and its particular mission to India. Secondly, the Society would have the task to stimulate giving throughout the year for the specific purpose of supporting the seminarians' education. We could learn about the young men that we are assisting, and individually follow them through their formation years. Perhaps we would even be able to invite a few of them to St. Jean's to speak with the Society and the parish at large.

If you are moved to become one of the founders of the **MISSION SOCIETY** please leave your name and telephone number at the rectory. We can then find a time to meet and discuss the project, and the next steps we are to take. This can be a great mission for our parish community. It can also be a blessing for our community.



DEACON RICHARD RUSSO



He was a man known for his endless treasury of jokes. But he was also a dedicated advocate for the hearing impaired, assisting them, most importantly, when they suffered medical or psychological problems. He worked in this capacity during the many years that he worked at Bellevue Hospital.

Deacon Russo passed over on October 16th. He is survived by his twin sister who is presently in a nursing home, and several cousins. His funeral Mass was celebrated here at Saint Jean's on October 19th. He was interred in Pinelawn Cemetery. May he rest in God's loving arms.

We are able to make these repairs are because of your generosity to the RENEW AND REBUILD campaign.


PLEASE TAKE NOTE:
