The Pastor's Reflections

We've just concluded the Liturgical Year by celebrating the Feast of Christ the King. It has left us with the powerful image of Christ enthroned on the cross – the divine judgment seat. From the cross, Christ views the pain and suffering, the selfishness, the power lust, and the darkness that contaminates the world God created. The crucified Christ condemns everything that works against God's light, at the same time redeeming the world from the powerful clutches of darkness.

This week we take our first step into the New Year with the image of Christ on the cross still lingering in our mind's eye. However, the Church asks us to turn our gaze from the judgment the cross passes on the world, to the redemption it offers. The New Year raises our hope that our world can be freed from the power and attraction of the darkness through Christ's redemptive love. On this first Sunday of the New Year we step into the Season of Hope, Advent. But sadly, Advent has taken quite a beating in our culture.

We've barely digested our Thanksgiving meal when we begin hearing Christmas carols as we shop, eat in restaurants and watch TV commercials. The Christmas hype kicks in immediately. In our part of the world we overlook Advent, and run directly from Thanksgiving to Christmas. This jarring transition isn't good for our spirit. We have to prepare for the celebration of the birth of the Light. We can't just jump into it! As a result, the weeks before Christmas are filled with contrasting emotions for many of us. We're not only anticipating the feeling of Christmas joy but, at the same time, we're feeling another emotion, maybe sadness, or nostalgia. Take a moment to think about what we go through those weeks before Christmas.



The tearjerker specials begin rolling through prime time TV. We're bombarded by songs about sleigh bells ringing, mommy kissing Santa Claus, chestnuts roasting on an open fire, and dreaming about a white Christmas just like the ones we used to know. We watch films about orphans, and poor families, about Scrooges discovering the "meaning of Christmas," about rogues transformed by the love of a child, about the old-time Christmas our great grandparents celebrated, about warmth and security and family. But oddly enough, these happy songs, and supposedly uplifting stories don't make us feel good. They make our hearts uncomfortable. We tend to feel distracted and unstable, and sometimes even sad and depressed. We begin to feel that deep inside we're missing something. We feel that the good old days have passed us by.

In addition, the holiday advertising blitz stokes up our anxiety. "I haven't had the time to buy a gift for everyone on my list!" "Oh God! I forgot to buy my Kris Cringle a gift!" "I can't go to one more holiday party!!!" "Who's doing Christmas this year?" "I have to go on a diet after the holidays." Sadly, Advent and has turned into an emotional mess for many of us. When Christmas finally arrives, it's a letdown, and we're glad it's over.

As the pastor and spiritual leader of this parish community I want to make some suggestions that just might help rescue this year's Christmas. To begin with, I want us to remember that we're Christians. This may sound very strange, but think about it. As Christians we're meant to celebrate "Christ with us" every day of the year. However, the vast army of retailers, armed with their multi-billion dollar TV and radio commercials, try to persuade us that their products will bring every one of us true happiness. They assure

us that the more we have, the happier we'll be, and the more we give to our children, the more they'll love us.

As Christians we have to ask ourselves serious faith questions in order to arm ourselves against this holiday onslaught. Will our children come to know the love of Jesus because we've given them more gifts than they can ever enjoy? Will receiving the newest iPhone help you or me experience Jesus more deeply in our lives? Will attending more and more "holiday parties," over-eating and drinking in excess, really help us discover the "true meaning of Christmas?" The answers are no, no and no! So why do we donate billions of dollars to the Temple of Retail each Christmas? Why do we max out our credit cards? Why do we make ourselves sick from over eating and drinking?

The answer is simple. We're trying to fill a profound void that pains our hearts most acutely during this season. Deep down in our souls we know that all the Christmas hoop-la that's generated by consumerism simply makes us want more and more. We know that when we take part in the buying frenzy of the season we're like addicts hoping that our next fix will bring nirvana. These things will never fill the void. They only make the pain worse.

Remember. We're Christians. We know deep down, that our deepest desire is for love, not things. Deep down, we know love can't be bought. Deep down we know that Christ, through his words and deeds taught us what love is. Love is the heart of Christmas. So I'm going to make a few pastoral suggestions that might help us embrace a new, Christ-centered, Christmas.

First of all, celebrate Advent! Start every day by centering yourself in the love of God. Take 60 seconds first thing in the day. Close your eyes and say over and over to yourself phrases like: "God knows me and loves me, and never stops saying my name." "God loves me just the way I am." "My God, I'm in your hands." Prayers like these can put an entirely new perspective on our day.

Secondly. Over the centuries the Church has gathered the most beautiful prophecies and scripture passages, arranging them day by day as a spiritual pathway to Christmas. Read them, and meditate on them. They can be googled: *Daily Readings for Year B: Revised Common Lectionary*. The first readings of the day from the Old Testament and the Letters of St. Paul continually speak of hope. In your meditations lift up hope for our world. Reach out in your prayer to those suffering in our country, and throughout the world, because of poverty, violence and war. See in your mind's eye a world at peace. See a world where no one is hungry. See the world as God intended it to be.

Thirdly. In your home, let your Christmas decorations be a family endeavor. Don't be afraid to make an Advent wreath. Light a candle every night, perhaps at dinner – one the first week of Advent, two the second week, and so on. Let Christmas approach gradually. Perhaps you can trim your Christmas tree but refrain from lighting it until Christmas Eve. Sing a religious carol as you do so, maybe Silent Night, or Hark, the Herald Angels Sing. That can be your way to put Christ the Light back into Christmas.

Fourthly. Restrain your gift giving, especially with your children. Make sure the gifts you give them can be enjoyed for a long time. Don't overwhelm them with too many gifts. Perhaps, as a family activity, you can

make cards for each member of the family that speak of your love for each other. These could be the most special gifts each of you will receive.

Last, but certainly not least, go to Mass as a family. The Church has a spiritual rhythm it keeps in preparation for Christmas. Join in the community anticipation. Celebrate Christmas on Christmas!

Christmas is the celebration of the Light, Jesus Christ. We begin every Liturgical Year with the Season of Advent-Christmas-Epiphany that celebrates the Light coming into the world. As Christians we want to celebrate the hope that it brings. After the celebration of Christmas the Christ's Light should be more intense in our hearts. After Christmas, we should know what Jesus meant when he said, "You are the light of the world."

REPAIR WORK

We are finishing up the repair of the plasterwork around one of the north windows of the clerestory. The scaffold will be removed next week. Felix Chavez, Inc. performed the repair work. This company renewed the entire interior of the church in 1997.

The special lift has been removed from the church. The John Tiedermann Company has finished plastering and repainting a number of spots that had peeled or were flaking due to past leaks.

You may have noticed that the scaffolding on the exterior of the dome is down. We finished the repair of the windows and extensive masonry work. The scaffolding and repairs cost \$350,000.

The work that has been done so far had been paid in full! We were able to make these repairs because of your generosity to the RENEW AND REBUILD campaign.

ST. JEAN BAPTISTE MISSION SOCIETY

On the occasion of Mission Sunday I proposed the establishment of a **MISSION SOCIETY** here at St. Jean's. I extend an invitation to all our parishioners to partner with the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament in India. We have vibrant communities there and many vocations. Our greatest challenge there is the support of our seminarians. Believe it or not, we sometimes have to turn young men away because we cannot cover the costs for their theological education.

The purpose of the **MISSION SOCIETY** would be, first of all, to learn about the work of the Order and its particular mission to India. Secondly, the Society would have the task to stimulate giving throughout the year for the specific purpose of supporting the seminarians' education. Society and the parish at large.

A number of parishioners have already joined this missionary effort. If you are moved to become one of the foundering members of the **MISSION SOCIETY** please leave your name and telephone number at the rectory.

Father Jegaraj, Provincial Superior of the Indian Province, has sent us pictures of the Novices and Seminarians and an explanation of the expenses incurred for their formation.

This can be an important mission for our parish community. It will also be a blessing for the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament in India. Thank you for your interest and support.

This is the Eymardian scholasticate at Pune, a city three hours' drive from Mumbai. There are 18 students here: 5 Philosophy students and 13 theology students with 2 priests. They are studying in the

seminary run by the Jesuits called Janna Deepa Vedyapeeth. It is a pontifical institute with close to 900 seminarians belonging to most of the dioceses in India and many religious congregations.

Educational fees for philosophy and theology for a year per student for two semesters is \$ 307 USD (RS 20000). \$154 USD per semester.

The monthly cost of providing a student's food, clothing, travel expenses, and personal needs is \$75 USD (Rs: 4875).



This is the Lamure Novitiate house at Goa. There are 6 novices at the moment. It is a two year program consisting of spiritual and religious formation. Here they are basically trained in the life and mission of the Congregation. They are here for the full two years, and all their expenses are fully met by the Congregation. Since it is formation program specifically for those interested in joining the Congregation, the Congregation assumes the expenses for education, boarding and lodging met the congregation. An expected 12 would join in May of 2018, and 5 from this group will join the seminary for further studies in September.

The Average cost of education would be \$154 USD (Rs 10000) per year.

In addition to the cost of education, the monthly cost of providing a student's food, clothing, travel expenses, and personal needs is \$60 USD (Rs:4000).
