The Pastor's Christmas Reflections

In this Christmas reflection I invite you to journey with me into the remarkable text of St. Luke's Gospel. When we kneel before the crèche, we see only a part of his story about the birth of Jesus. So, for a broader, more expansive interpretation, I'm going to take a step back from this familiar tableau into Luke's written text.

Luke 1:5-80

Luke began his account of the birth of Jesus with a respectful bow towards the past. He does this by focusing on an elderly, childless couple, Elizabeth and Zachariah.

Elizabeth and Zachariah were so much like Israel. They yearned their entire married lives to have a child, but now they were too old. People even mocked Elizabeth calling her barren. The couple had given up hoping.

Israel, too, was old. God had entered into a covenant with Abraham many centuries ago, but Israel was still longing for its fulfillment. Israel was waiting for a Messiah – a hero who would rebuild the Jewish kingdom and initiate an era of peace and prosperity - a golden age.

Luke took up his beautiful narrative in the temple in Jerusalem where Zachariah had just offered the incense of thanksgiving, a prayer for himself, and for all of Israel. He was suddenly overcome with terror. The door to heaven had opened, and an angel manifested himself to him. *"Zachariah, do not be afraid. God has heard your prayer."* How many years had he hoped to hear those words, and how many centuries had Israel, faithful to God's covenant, longed for the consolation of a similar message.

Elizabeth was to give birth to a son! *"You will have joy and gladness, and many will rejoice at his birth...He will be filled with the Holy Spirit even from his mother's womb, and he will turn many of the children of Israel to the Lord their God."* He will have the power and spirit of Elijah the prophet, and he will *"prepare a people fit for*



the Lord."

Zachariah could not get his mind around this incredible message. He and his wife were old! It was impossible! Alerted to his doubts, the angel then revealed his name, Gabriel, which meant *"God is my strength,"* and continued with his message. *"I was sent to speak to you the Good News...but you did not believe my words...now you will be speechless...until these things take place."*

When Zachariah returned from the altar of incense unable to speak, the people knew he had seen a vision. Finally, they thought, after five hundred years of silence since the last prophet had spoken, God spoke to Zachariah. Something truly marvelous was unfolding. In a short time, Elizabeth became pregnant. Gabriel's message was becoming reality!

Six months later, Gabriel again stepped through the heavenly portal. He revealed himself to a young girl who was engaged to Joseph, a descendant of Israel's greatest king, David. She, like Zachariah, was terrified by the vision. *"Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favor with God. Behold, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son and you shall name him Jesus. He will be great*

and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord will give him the throne of David his father, and he will rule over the house of Jacob forever."

Mary was a young girl. How could this be? She wasn't even married yet. The angel interjected something new and marvelous; *"The Holy Spirit will come upon you, therefore the child to be born shall be called holy, the Son of God."* Mary knew the history of her people. She knew that the Spirit had overshadowed Moses, Aaron and the elders of Israel during the Exodus from Egypt. That same Spirit was overshadowing her! What was going to happen to her? What was this message all about? The angel continued.

"And behold, Elizabeth, your kinswoman has also conceived a son in her old age. This is the sixth month for her who was called barren; for nothing is impossible for

God." Here, Luke subtly injected an interpretation into Gabriel's words. Elizabeth, the mother of the last prophet of Israel, was six months pregnant when Mary was told that she was chosen to give birth to "the Son of God." Six is the number that represents incompleteness. The old time was about to come to an end. A new time was about to dawn. Elizabeth's child would announce the arrival of the Messianic time! Who could have imagined this moment?

John, the author of the last Gospel, commented on this moment in this way: "And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory of the Father's only begotten Son, full of grace and truth. (John 1:14)" God was to become a human being! He would be the Messiah, a savior, a new Joshua. He would lead a New Israel into a new promised land – not a land surrounded by national borders – but a borderless, sacred land that would warmly welcome all God's children without exception.

Then Luke penned the most important words in the entire Scripture, Old and New Testament. "Mary said, 'Behold, I am the Lord's slave. May it be done to me according to your will.'" She could never have known what this would mean for her, but she gave herself totally to the will of God. She said "yes!"

Six months earlier, when Elizabeth became pregnant "she went into seclusion for five months, saying, 'The Lord...has seen fit to take away my disgrace before others.'" She, like Mary, was ready to submit to the divine plan, but Elizabeth needed to ponder its meaning. Mary, however, "set out in haste to a town in Judah where she entered the house of Zachariah and greeted Elizabeth." Mary, the mother of the new time, overshadowed by the power of the Spirit, did not think about herself. She immediately reached out to the elderly Elizabeth.

This is a beautiful moment in Luke's script. The once barren woman, Elizabeth, who by God's grace had become fruitful, came face to face with the fertile, young girl, Mary. The old time, the old Israel, met the new time, the new Israel. Elizabeth's son would be Israel's last prophet. He would close one long chapter of salvation history. Mary's son would be the fulfillment of centuries of prophecy. He would begin a new chapter by inaugurating the new time, the Messianic time.

Mary and Elizabeth's embrace brought together the old and the new, and the last prophet of Israel danced for joy. "Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, cried out in a loud voice, 'The moment the sound of your greeting reached my ears, the infant in my womb leaped for joy. Blessed are you who believed that what was spoken to you by the Lord would be fulfilled!'" Mary stayed with Elizabeth until she came to term.

The story continued eight days after Elizabeth gave birth when family and friends gathered to circumcise the child incorporating him into the people of the covenant and giving him his name.

An argument ensued during this joyous celebration when Elizabeth insisted that the child be named John. The family demanded that, in keeping with tradition, the child be named Zachariah after his father. Zachariah, still unable to speak, wrote on a tablet, "No. He will be called John." This child would not be named Zachariah, "God remembers." He will be named John, "beloved of God." The child "grew and became strong

in spirit, and he was in the desert until the day of his manifestation to Israel."

Luke 2:1-21

Luke suddenly shifted his narrative from the life of a family in Judah to a global event, the Roman census. Every person was to be counted, marked for taxation. For the Jewish people this was a humiliation because they were under Roman occupation. But through the census the emperor was claiming his subjects. This was a religious problem, because for the Jewish people, God was their only King.

But the day was drawing near when a new Israel would give its allegiance to another king. The day would come when Mary's child, with his arms outstretched in welcome, would be given his royal title, "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews." Then, the long awaited new time will have begun.

All of Luke's imagery is prophetic at this point. Mary gave birth to her son in Bethlehem, which means "the house of bread." She placed him in a manger, the trough used to feed the animals. This child would one day take bread, bless it, break it, and give it to his disciples. He would tell them, "This is my body, which will be given for you; do this in memory of me."

Then, a third time in his narrative, heaven's door opened, and for a third time the angel spoke words of comfort, "Do not be afraid!" This time he appeared to shepherds in a field. They were told to go in search of a sign from God. "You will find a child wrapped in swaddling clothes and lying in a manger." They did find a child, in Bethlehem. He was indeed lying in a manger. He was wrapped in cloths that intimated the shroud that would bind him until the moment of his resurrection.

The shepherds left filled with joy at what they had seen. That night there was no room in the inn for that child. But the shepherds, the first to see and believe, accepted him into their hearts. They went back into the darkness of the night filled with the divine light - filled with hope, filled with joy. They had seen Jesus whose name means "God saves."

The angel's message to Mary was so true. "Nothing is impossible for God."

I wish you all a blessed Christmas. May his light burn ever brightly in your heart. Do not be afraid to bring that light into the darkness.

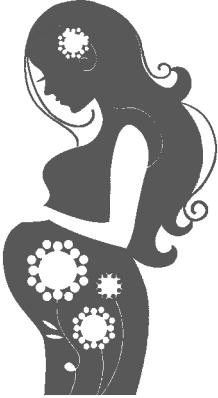
