

The Pastor's Reflections



Jesus had just emerged from an obscure life in Nazareth. He went to the Jordan River and there was baptized by John. When he came out of the water he heard the voice of his Father affirming him and his mission. He immediately went into seclusion in the desert to prepare himself for his ministry. Shortly after leaving the desert, he began to gather disciples who could collaborate with him in his work. Andrew, Peter, James and John were the first to follow him. The little band made its way to the synagogue in Capernaum. There Jesus launched his ministry. Why did Jesus so often choose to perform his ministry of preaching and healing in neighborhood synagogues? To answer that question we need to know about the synagogue of Jesus' day.

The synagogue wasn't a little Temple. The Temple in Jerusalem was the one and only center of Jewish liturgical life. During its elaborate celebra-

tions there was music and singing, processions and daily sacrifices. The synagogue was primarily a teaching institution. The morning, afternoon and evening prayers were recited there but, outside the times of prayer, it was the local center of teaching. The daily activity always included men and boys reading and expounding the scriptures.

The Temple's liturgical life was supported with the assistance of many priests and various ministers. They offered the sacrifices, and assured the orthodoxy of the liturgy. The synagogue, on the other hand, was managed by an elected president. It was his job to

oversee and maintain the property, and to organize the activities of the synagogue. The law prescribed that in whatever town or village where there were ten or more Jewish families, there had to be a synagogue. The synagogue was the center of Jewish life. It was the perfect place for Jesus to preach the message.

Why would Jesus have chosen Capernaum to deliver his first teaching and to perform his first healing? Capernaum was in Galilee, the area through which the international trade routes connected the countries of the north, south and east. Being a cosmopolitan area, it tended to be open to new ideas. It was financially stable because of the trade, and had a vibrant fishing industry along the Sea of Galilee. Also, Simon Peter lived in Capernaum, and offered his home as a base for the group.

Mark tells us that Jesus and his small band of

followers “came to Capernaum, and on the Sabbath, Jesus entered the synagogue and taught.” The Sabbath, the day of rest, was the perfect day for the synagogue president to schedule interesting speakers and teachers who might be in the area as part of his Sabbath programming.

We aren’t told what Jesus taught, but his style was a breath of fresh air to the people of Capernaum. “The people were astonished at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority and not as the scribes.” The scribes were students of the law and taught that every law always needed interpretation. They also believed that every nuance of the law needed to be documented and followed. Hence, they transformed the Ten Commandments to six hundred and thirteen! There was no heart to their teaching, only legalities. One was obliged to follow the law because it came from God. It was their duty to explain the law. Also, it wasn’t common for teachers of the law, like the scribes, to present a teaching on their own authority. They always backed it up with references and to teachings of the great sages of the past. Jesus seemed to ignore this scribal style. What he taught came from him alone. His teaching was simple, and never legalistic. His style was compassionate and simple. He seemed to have taught from the heart. He was the peoples’ rabbi.

His inaugural appearance was quite dramatic. The people of the synagogue were not only impressed by the content of his teaching, they were shocked with the power he exhibited. There was a member of the synagogue who suffered under the influence of an “unclean spirit.” This dark spirit immediately recognized Jesus as God’s anointed, and cried out, “What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are – the Holy One of God!” With no hesitation, and without any incantations or prayers, Jesus commanded the spirit to be silent, and to come out of the man. The man fell into convulsions, and loudly cried out as the spirit left the man.

The people in the synagogue were shocked by the event. “All were amazed and asked one another, ‘What is this? A new teaching with authority! He commands even the unclean spirits and they obey him.’”

From the little synagogue in Capernaum word of Jesus spread throughout Galilee.

We learn a number of things about Jesus from this short account. He broke with the legalism of the scribes. The people were oppressed by the plethora of laws laid on them by their religious leaders. Jesus taught from his heart. He spoke of God as a loving and forgiving Father rather than a strict judge. We know he had harsh words for Israel’s religious leaders, the Scribes and Pharisees, because of their legalistic approach to religion. For him, religion was a loving relationship with God – not a strict adherence to laws.

We also learn that Jesus was a healer. A great deal of his ministry would involve curing the sick. He literally touched people to cure them, even lepers, an action forbidden by the law. He had no fear of the dark powers. In fact, the dark powers feared him. His first healing drove out an unclean spirit.

Let’s conclude our reflection by looking ahead to the last lines of Mark’s Gospel. “He said to them, ‘Go out into the whole world and proclaim the Good News to every creature... These signs will accompany those who believe: in my name they will drive out demons and speak new languages. They will pick up deadly serpents, and if they drink any deadly thing, it will not harm them. They will lay hands on the sick, and they will recover...’ So they went forth and preached everywhere, while the Lord worked with them and confirmed the word through accompanying signs. (Mark: 16:15, 17-18, 20)”

Our reflection on Jesus’ first day of ministry is simple. Jesus unveiled his mission and his ministry to his disciples knowing that they would witness to all he did and taught. Later on, before his ascension, he commissioned them to continue his ministry. That commission is extended today to everyone who is willing to carry on his mission of healing and liberating. We, on our part, must be sure not to succumb to the kind of legalism Jesus fought against. God’s healing and saving power comes through a heart that’s open to love. We must never forget that discipleship demands, first and foremost, a relationship. God is our Father, and so we’re brothers and sisters. The power of love binds us to God and to one another. Through that love we become the vehicles of his teaching and healing.


